# Defensible Space Guide


The following are considerations when evaluating your defensible space

### • Home Ignition Zone

- 0-5 Feet from house
- Remove all dead vegetation touching your house
  - Gutters
  - Shingles
  - Eaves
  - Decks
  - Leaves and needles
- Keep tree limbs at least 8 feet away from your roof
- Fire resistant building material
- ZONE 1
  - Lean, Clean and Green
    - 5-30 feet from house
    - Keep grass watered and/or cut short (4inches or less) before fire season
  - Only watered and green vegetation should be in this zone

### • ZONE 2

- Break the fire!
- This area should not be able to carry fire. If you lit a fire along the yellow line, could it make it to your house?
  - Remove continuous fuel accumulation (Vertical and Horizontal)
    - Bushes under trees or tree limbs touching ground/grass?
      - Limb trees 8 feet from ground
    - Blackberry or Scotch broom? Remove.
- ZONE 3
  - Put the fire back on the ground!
    - Remove dead vegetation
    - Remove Ladder fuels- "ramp" vegetation like storm damage that leads to the canopy
    - Thin Understory Vegetation (scotch broom, dead/dying fir trees)



#### STEPS TO BECOME A NATIONALLY RECOGNIZED FIREWISE COMMUNITY

- 1. Fill out the information on the attached form
  - 1.1. Identify committee members
  - 1.2. Sign up at least 8 homes/housing units to participate
- 2. Set appointment with ODF representative to get a Wildfire Risk Assessment (WRA)

#### 3. Use information from WRA to develop a Community Action Plan

- 3.1. Identify 3 Actions that will improve community readiness
  - A. Examples:
    - removing dead and dying vegetation, improving defensible space around homes (cleaning gutters and roofs, screening overhangs and soffits) clearing access routes, thinning understory vegetation on community lands and many others
  - B. Write Action Plan
    - 1-2 pages regarding steps and timeline of actions community has agreed upon (ODF fire planning coordinator will help with this)
- 4. Submit Action Plan to ODF representative
- 5. Make minor changes if needed
- 6. Become a nationally recognized Firewise Community!
